



(Un)Known Artists of the Amazon

24 April 2024 to 21 April 2025 Weltmuseum Wien

No Indigenous Amazonian language has a word for art, yet it connects people's everyday lives, rituals, and environments. (Un)Known Artists of the Amazon at the Weltmuseum Wien presents Indigenous art from Brazil – from traditional feather art to contemporary works. The museum showcases art produced by Indigenous artists and groups who are not presented as victims of colonialism but how they see themselves: as strong, creative survivors with vibrant traditions.

Towards the individual artist

Unlike in the West, here art is able to see life as a continuous whole – it connects people's everyday lives, rituals, and environment. For a long time, the creators of this art were not recognized as individuals. They were seen merely as representatives of their communities and traditions. The Weltmuseum Wien holds around 4,000 objects from the Brazilian Amazon region. They are linked to ethnic designations but rarely to the names of their creators. Things are very different at the Museu de Arte Indígena in Curitiba, Brazil, with whom we are collaborating for this exhibition: in their collections almost all the artists are identified by name, and the museum remains in contact with them.

The exhibition is conceived as a dialogue between the two collections. Bringing together over 120 objects, the show's curators examine how autonomous artworks evolved out of functional and ritual objects, opening up new perspectives on the (un)known artists of the Amazon.



From functional and ritual objects to autonomous works of art

The Amazon region is both a diverse, man-made cultural landscape and one of the world's most important ecosystems. Over 200 Indigenous societies live in the Brazilian Amazon region alone. They differ, amongst other things, in their language and culture. What they have in common is that they shape their world with art forms that connect them with their ecological and spiritual environment.

The exhibition begins with artworks made of feathers, an art form much admired in the West. Works from the Ka'apor, Yanomami and Tapirapé document the outstanding craftsmanship of their otherwise largely anonymous makers. The same is true for the Rikbaktsa artefacts that feather artist Messias Rikbaktsa selected from the collection of the Weltmuseum Wien. The hammocks by Tainá Kamayurá hovering above the visitors illustrate how environmental impressions are reflected in the design of artistic everyday objects. This also applies to the wooden benches that recall animal shapes: artists recognize them in a tree and, after the tree has been felled, carve them from a single block of wood. Ceramics, too, shown together with artefacts used for processing manioc, illustrate the remarkable progression from domestic, everyday objects to works of sculpture.

Indigenous Amazonian art is, however, also performative art: masked dances are part of many rituals and facilitate interaction with spiritual beings. In the context of contemporary art, masks have now become artworks that no longer serve any practical function; this establishes clear boundaries between ritually used objects and similar objects for the art trade.

Body painting and ornaments continue to play a central role. Jewellery fashioned from glass beads was introduced with the arrival of missionaries and explorers. In the work of present-day artists, most of whom produce necklaces and bracelets, this art has evolved into an expression of self-empowerment and independence.

In the 1970s, artists like Feliciano Lana discovered Western drawing and painting techniques. Today, Lana's illustrations of the Desana mythology are collected by, for instance, the MoMA in New York. Macuxi Jaider Esbell, who died in 2021, was shown at the São Paulo and Venice Biennales, and is also represented in the exhibition.

The show was curated by Claudia Augustat, curator of the South America Collection of the Weltmuseum Wien, and Julianna Podolan Martins, director of the Museu de Arte Indígena in Curitiba.

The Museu de Arte Indígena in Curitiba


The privately run Museu de Arte Indigena in Curitiba celebrates its fifteenth birthday in 2024. Since its foundation, it has focused on the appreciation and recognition of the cultures and artistic work of Indigenous groups in Brazil.

In Brazil, Indigenous art is gaining increased visibility and Indigenous artists are being recognized as individuals and authors. Their art is showcased in museums, institutions, national and international Biennales and art galleries. Artist collectives are emerging and producing contemporary works whose cultural references are clearly recognizable. Authorship is emphasized and Indigenous groups are emerging as the creators of their works.

An exhibition at the zam of the Weltmuseum Wien

(Un)Known Artists of the Amazon is shown in the zam gallery of the Weltmuseum Wien. This participatory area of the museum, which is open to the public free of charge, is dedicated to developing, exploring, and presenting relevant contemporary issues in various formats in partnership with communities of remembrance, communities of origin, and visitors. The show is also part of the Klima Biennale Wien 2024 and gives visitors the opportunity to address, work on, and shape current and future-relevant topics together.
